Ah the thrill and anticipation of the first day of school, not that there was any great ritualized preparations, but there was a usual flow of activity. Within the weeks preceding that great freedom day for mom, there was usually a trip or two to the plaza, to Zellers to see what durable clothes could be had. There was no great pursuit for labeled fashions as I don't recall there being any. The closest thing to a label was levis jeans because they were the only brand and the denim was durable. The big fashion forward event was the advent of bell bottom jeans. There was kind of a mental note to see how long the knees lasted before they needed to be patched. Now a days, people pay big bucks to have rips and tears in the jeans that mom worked so hard to prevent or fix. The biggest item with any fashion appeal were really the lunch boxes. Certainly the options back then pale in comparison to the variety of super heroes and cartoon character they have today. Getting on the bus for the first was somewhat perilous. There was an unofficial pecking order to seating. The older the grade, the closer to the back you could sit, and not that there were any great confrontations, usually a glaring look from someone in an older grade was sufficient to motivate you to move. You then visited that same strategy on the younger graders to inspire them to know their place. Arrival at the school was like a great homecoming. Since we were all bus students arriving from the various and distanced places in the school district, we hadn't seen most of our classmates all summer. The cool people came from the Landing, and there were the River Drive Park people and then there were the marsh-muckers, the kids you probably worked on their family farm during the summer, and I think they were likely doubly happy that school started. The school field which had only recently been mowed for the first time since June smelled fresh and sweet and had left long lines of straw that were kicked into piles to create forts and castles and whatever the imagination dreamed up. The excitement and exuberance of seeing classmates again was infection but it was also a time when we encountered those students who had failed the grade. They were forced to line up with the previous grade, or in our case, we were now peers with those who failed our grade last year. Rarely was there a genuine new comer so when there was it was a point of fascination and barraging them with questions galore. In our single filed march to the classroom, escorted by our teacher, again, a new teacher was a rare event, we entered a classroom all organized, with nametags on our assigned desks, neatly aligned topped with the text books, pencil, pen, eraser, ruler, protractor and the right amount of scribblers for each subject. We would later follow instructions as to how there were to be organized into

a clean and empty desk shelves. I am sure that the teacher had spent hours strategizing about who would sit next to whom in an effort to divide and conquer and head trouble off at the pass. This year's first day of school has a whole new flavour to it for parents and teachers and students alike, but even in the midst of these confusing and uncertain times there is fun, and hope and excitement in this new beginning. Two Months of Being Semi-Open
