Ruminations

With the Archdiocese allowing the Parish Office to be open for only limited hours (here it is 9 - 1 twice a week), one of the fringe benefits is that the constant debate about whether the office is too cold, or too hot (FYI – just right is not an option) has been rather mute. Just for the record, I have never said that the Office has been too cold, in fact, usually whenever that topic comes up, I take the stoic approach, just roll my eyes and walk away. I never really understood how the temperature setting, maintained at a constant number, can be on the one hand too cold and moments later, without being re-adjusted, too hot. Part of the resolution has been for me to allow the Office staff to be the custodians of the Office thermostat. In a sense, that little digital box has become sacred ground and only those worthy are able to control its ebb and flow. In relinquishing that responsibility to others, I have made the house thermostat my exclusive locus of power (though on occasion I have discovered that it has been tampered with). Well, over the period when the Office was totally shut down, I felt this rush of power when I touched the verboten controls and lowered the setting. Since I was the only person allowed on the premises, I got to rule my domain, that was until we partially opened up again. With limited hours comes limited conversations about the Office. Recently however, I had been noticing that the Office was becoming uncomfortably chilly, to the point where I started keeping a sweater on hand for those times I needed to go into the Office area. It was very perplexing and even a bit disheartening. At first I thought I was coming down with something, a flu or a cold or gulp, Covid. Over the several days of this phenomenon, it seemed to be getting colder. Then I started lamenting that it was one of those realities of getting older – the circulation is slowing, or the body requires more warmth. Then I decided it had to be that since the beginning of Lent I had dropped a few pounds and so the loss of insulation was affecting my reaction to the cold. That was a much happier thought, though admittedly, the few pounds that I have dropped could easily be replaced by a nice pizza with double cheese and double pepperoni. As much as I liked this idea and deceptively flattered myself, I knew it was delusional. Each time I had to go into the Office, it started to play on my mind, then one day I was walking past the digital controls. Now I have been trained very well to avoid touching that contraption. I had no business with it, and that training has rendered a pavlovian aversion to even being near that part of the Office. After several passes by the controls, I stated glancing over my shoulder to make sure I was alone. I checked the house to make sure that no one was here and then when back into the Office. With one last check I reached out and touched the digital screen with great fear and trepidation. As the screen lit up I cringed as I dared to peek at what was appearing. I am sure that it was kind of like Eve

reaching out for the apple. As I anticipated the numbers, the system is still in Fahrenheit, I expected seeing a solid 68 degrees. What appeared was a note that they system was off. It was not generating any heat and the temperature had lowered to 61 degrees – that's 20 degrees Celsius for the younger people. The good news is that once I fired up the heat, I can leave my sweater on the hook. *7t. Roy*
