Ruminations

I am so thrilled with the results of our carpet ride. It was such a long time coming delayed by the pandemic by over a year. The carpet crusaders deserve a lot of credit for their persistence and work to tackle this much needed project. Of course it has created a movement to turn the attention to the carpet in the hall. With that under our belt, it is time to turn our thoughts to Easter decorating, inside and outside. Probably what has gone unnoticed is the pair of poinsettias that look almost as good as they did when they arrived before Christmas. I have never had Christmas plants survive all the way to Easter. I would like to attribute it to a green thumb, but I think it is more about a miracle than my prowess with poinsettias. Just as poinsettias are synonymous with Christmas, Easter lilies and hydrangeas are expected for the Paschal season. The problem is that Christmas extends just over two weeks whereas Easter lasts a lengthy seven weeks. Easter lilies are good for two weeks at best, or maybe three is we are lucky. And hydrangeas are just very high maintenance and unless we provide additional light for them, they are lucky to last a month. The outside flower urns and planters are dependent upon the weather. Easter this year is so early that typical plants are not ready. The other consideration is removing the Christmas flora. They are pretty solidly iced in. I was hoping that the warm Spring days would have allowed them to be pulled out, but as I donned my shorts and tee shirt to remove them, I soon learned that they were all just blocks of ice. I remember hearing stories from my parents and grandparents of ice blocks being cut out of Lake Wilcox in Oak Ridges, and these ice blocks were buried below ground to preserve them for the warmer months, long before every house had a refrigerator. So I pulled and I yanked and I tugged and I managed to get some out. Funny enough, the planters that had lots of exposure to the sun were fairly workable though the soil remained a solid block. Those more shaded, well the only solution was to cut them off at the base. Now that they are emptied, the next question is what can go in the planters. Well despite their name, at this time unless there is an incredible heat wave, nothing can be planted – no tulips or hyacinths or crocuses or pansies. Luckily the planter queen has offered to help. Maryanne is coming down from the north (if she is not snowed in) to lend her expertise. She asked me if I have various garden tools, like a trowel, or mini cultivator, or sharp fiskars. Of course I have the typical array of tools, but then she asked if I had an ice pick and mini-ax. I was just a bit confused so she explained that no matter how warm it may be between now and Holy Saturday, we will be dealing with ice and if anything is to happen in those planters, we will be chipping and chopping to make room for whatever plants we can find. With the weather forecast for next week, the chances of a thawed medium is remote, and in fact, the cold weather returning might mean that whatever had already softened may

harden up again. So I asked her if I also need to wear lumberjack equipment to dress up the urns and planters for Easter. Late April Easters are way easier.

Holy Week will be a much different experience as many of the liturgical treasures of this season will be curtailed. No typical distribution of Palms on Passion Sunday. (Please note that those who do not attend Palm Sunday can still pick up palms following the 11 am Mass until 1:00 pm.) No washing of the feet, o procession of the Eucharist on Holy Thursday; no procession of the cross as we have become accustomed to celebrating on Good Friday; no baptisms or initiations, no outside bonfire and blessing of the Paschal Candle at the Vigil.
