

I reckon that because of the Pandemic lockdowns and the various states of closures among the stores, the anticipated outing of going to the grocery store has taken on a whole new level of excitement. I think I am beginning to judge shopping experiences first by the kind of hand sanitizers that have started gracing the entrances. At the start of the pandemic, most of the sanitizers were rather harsh and sterile smelling. It was a most unpleasant practice and probably hindered best hygienic efforts. Jump ahead over a year and now many of the gels or liquids smell rather pleasant with whispers of lilac or lavender.
