Ruminations

I can't remember if I was a great proponent of arts and crafts in kindergarten. I can still picture the painting easels and the little pots of paint, and I have a vivid memory of needing to bring one of mom or dads old shirts that we would don backwards to act as painting coveralls or an artist's smock. In the senior years in elementary school, we were divided between the boys and the girls for art. The girls did creative fancy stuff with various media, paint, charcoal, pastels. The boys brought their pencils, erasers, and rulers. We did perspective drawing – no colour, no creativity, no fun. I remember the day when the art teacher told me that I have no artistic talent and so when it came time to choose high school options and back then the options were home economics, typing, art, or shop. I wanted to try art but that bug in my ear scared me away and since I already knew how to type, I opted for shop. Now shop was divided in two; half the year we worked in metal shop, and the other half we did woodworking. Shop was by far my worst high school mark. I had no head, nor hands, nor talent for such endeavours and if the truth be known, I think I was the recipient of pity marks, like extra marks for spelling my name right. The only consolation was that as incompetent as I was, there were still worse artisans than me. At the end of the woodworking term we had to make a foot stool. As the teacher surveyed my results, he asked me if I had signed up for grade 10 shop. I lowered my head and admitted that I had enrolled in German as an option instead of shop. I think he smiled and said, "I think that is best'. I don't think I am any more competent now, but I have much less fear. If I want to dabble in those arcane arts of woodworking or metal, I assume the attitude of not caring what people think of it- mostly. I think that is one of the benefits of reaching certain age blocks. Now is something is going to be in the public forum, I have a bit different attitude. Having a strong perfectionist streak, I have a bit of concern for the outcome of projects. Case in point, I wanted to make a medicine wheel for our display for First Nations. The round circle was incredibly easy. I said, Frank, will you cut me a circle from this board and it was done. Then it came time to paint it. I would have used brush and paint, but with the Covid restrictions, I couldn't go into the store and browse the colour palette so I ordered spray paint to use. I taped the quadrants and covered them. The directions said it would take about 10 minutes to dry and then I could paint another colour. What could be simpler? Did you know spray paint can still bleed under the tape? And just because it says 10 minute drying time, the yellow stayed wet for over 3 hours and so when I put paper over it to protect it from the red spray, most of the vellow came up with the paper though part of the paper had fused to the wood and the articles from the paper had been transferred onto

the wood. It took four days to paint it and I was so thankful when the stores opened up that Friday morning I was the third person into Michaels to pick up containers of paint to correct the many feeble attempts at painting the medicine wheel. I thought back to my shop teacher and finally agreed with him that yes, it was probably a good thing I switched out of shop and into German. Ausgezeichnet!
