
Offering Envelopes

Ruminations

As I peeked out the kitchen window this morning I was excited to see the first blossom of the big orange lilies in my backyard open and brilliant in the morning sun. It was towering over four feet on this sturdy stem with glorious purple clematis in full bloom as its backdrop. I have always loved these orange lilies, though some of the lemon yellow ones in the gardens out in the islands of the parking lot might be able to rival their cousins. Out at my aunts' farm, they had a huge spread of them at the entrance of their drive away and another stand in their garden at the front of the house. During the first weeks of summer, the four of us were shipped off for a week's stay. Personally I went kicking and screaming, but it somehow always seem to fall on the occasion of my aunts' annual lawn party where all the old farmers from the other farms came for the festivities. The preparations for the big invent involved making vases of orange lilies and Queen Anne's Lace which always seemed more like a weed to me, but under the artistic hands of my grandaunt, with some added stems and flowers became floral magic. The other mandatory preparation was opening gifts. Every year my aunts would buy a set of shorts and shirts for us, all matching, and usually navy shorts and pink shirts. I think they thought it was cute to have us all costumed as centre pieces for all their crony friends, either that or we were dressed to be uniformed waiters pouring tea and distributing de-crusted sandwiches and home-made desserts. The one good thing is that they were never able to gauge my size and invariably my prison garb was annually too small. They had a beautiful silver maple tree that was kind of headquarters for the outdoor event but the whole lawn had various stations of chairs and tables. The limits of the lawn were the wheat field on the west, the corn on the east, the house at the front and the beautiful extensive garden at the back. We were the recipients of many of the flowers that needed to be divided. In fact, six of the peoples here in the gardens are direct descendants of those gardens that I dug up when we sold mom's house. I always wanted some of the orange lilies but my dad always declined the offer of those particular plants and I found it rather perplexing. It wasn't until much later when the annual trek to the farm had ended that I discovered the hidden family dynamics. This annual tea service was always part of my aunts' July 12 celebrations - the glorious twelfth, Orangemen's Day. My grandfather was catholic or 'the papist' as he was dis-affectionately nicknamed. Stories of him being chased off the farm with shotguns in hand because he was courting my Church of Ireland grandmother, and so I think my aunts' had this devious streak in them to have the little papists serving their orange friends on that Protestant gathering. And later I learned too, that the orange lily at the drive ways was a signal that Irish Protestants lived here. That is a fun story as family sagas go, but I prefer to think that my aunts, the sisters of my grandmother who died when dad was a young

boy, were just trying to do right by their sister's grandchildren, and had enough pride of us on her behalf. That's how I like to remember it, though the Protestant/ Catholic thing rings a lot of truth to it. And either way, we still had no orange lilies in our garden at home. Happy summer.
