Ruminations

As we ease into an easing of the restrictions, I have been given permission to visit the schools in person which has been a welcome event. This past week I have been visiting one of the schools. It feels so good to be in the classrooms again, from the rambunctious, overly energized primary grades to the inert, unresponsive, too cool upper grades, to the extremely interactive class that asked such wonderful questions and we had such a great discussion that time slipped past and I was so late for the next class that we had to reschedule it until after recess. It was a great thing to have the recess break because I went from this engaging interactive grade six class to what seemed like a pulseless, passionately disinterested muted class of teenagers. Ugh! I think the most enlightening part of the day though was the recess break, and not in one of those exasperated, 'let-me-catch-my-breath-again' episodes after realizing that I am getting too old to follow the high octane antics of a classroom full of kindergartens or grade oners, (those teachers are saints, I marvel how they can endure the energy levels of all those wonderful kids), but because it gave me a chance to stare out of the second floor window onto the playground. It was just one of those special, epiphany moments. I'm not sure how many kids were out there but it was a marvel to behold. There were the older girls who just sat on the far pavement far from the maddening crowds and talked, the older boys playing soccer, the younger kids playing soccer and engaging in more antics and goofy play than worried about winning or scoring goals. There was a group of younger kids trying to play basketball. None of them were strong enough to get the ball high enough to touch the rim, but they never got frustrated and they never stopped trying and they just enjoyed all those unsuccessful tosses without batting an eye. There were the kids playing 'chase each other' who seemed to find such joy in just running after each other, and it mattered not if they ever caught the other, you could see there was just sheer joy in running. There were the boys and girls just puttering around in the sandbox (now it was too far away for these old eyes to see just what exactly there were doing, but they were doing it with great enthusiasm and concentration. There was the group playing a bit of an organized game in the painted boxes on the pavement and I say a bit of an organized game, because I am pretty sure that the rules never stated that you had to do cartwheels, but I saw more cartwheels happening than structured play, because if you can cartwheel, then why not. It made me reflect upon one of my courses, the Psychology of Sport in my second year at university, and the health differences between structured and free play. It was amazing to see the creativity and freedom and cooperation and uninhibited joy that was living out in that playground. But what also came to mind was a bit of a revelation of just what Jesus meant when He said that the kingdom belongs to those who are like little children. It makes so much more sense to me having witnessed those young people, even the inert



intermediates expressing the kingdom of God in those couple of acres in Holland Landing. As I keep telling everyone, Holland Landing has always been God's place on earth. If only I could do cartwheels whenever the mood struck me – it wouldn't be pretty, or recognizable, or safe for that matter. Play on, young people, while you have the energy and the freedom and the ability to be filled with joy. Fr. Roy

and the 14th. The candies will be delivered to "Canadian Food for Children" an organization started by Dr. Simone.



If you like your real Christmas Tree, please get it sooner rather than later. Our years of experience with fresh cut trees is to leave them outside in the cold until you wish to put it up. This will help keep the tree fresh and last longer.

Society of St Vincent de Paul Fifth World Day of the Poor 14 Nov 2021

Last June Pope Francis announced that the Fifth World Day of the Poor would be held on 14 November 2021, the 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time.

Here are a few excerpts from the Pope's message:

- "The face of God revealed by Jesus is that of a Father concerned for and close to the poor. In everything, Jesus teaches that poverty is not the result of fate, but a concrete sign pointing to his presence among Us";
- "We do not find Christ when and where we want, but see him in the lives of the poor, in their sufferings and needs, in the often inhuman conditions in which they are forced to live."
- "In short, believers, when they want to see Jesus in person and touch him with their hands, know where to turn. The poor are a sacrament of Christ; they represent his person and point to him."
- "There seems to be a growing notion that the poor are not only responsible for their condition, but that they represent an intolerable burden for an economic system focused on the interests of a few privileged groups."
- "How can we give a tangible response to the millions of the poor who frequently encounter only indifference, if not resentment? What path of justice must be followed so that social inequalities can be overcome and human dignity, so often trampled upon, can be restored?"
- "We do well to recall the words of Saint John Chrysostom: "Those who are generous should not ask for an account of the poor's conduct, but only improve their condition of poverty and satisfy their need... Do not ask anything else of them; but even if they are the most wicked persons in the world, if they lack the necessary nourishment, let us free them from hunger. ... Therefore, when you see on land a man or a woman who has suffered the shipwreck of poverty, do not judge, do not ask for an account of their conduct, but deliver them from their misfortune."
- "It is my hope that the celebration of the World Day of the Poor, now in its fifth year, will grow in our local Churches and inspire a movement of evangelization that meets the poor personally wherever they may be."

Your local conference of the Society of St Vincent de Paul is looking for new members, especially men and married couples, to reach out and meet the poor personally, as the Pope is urging.
