New Year's Day was a particularly uneventful celebration growing up. It was really more of a recovery day from the festivities of the past week since Christmas day. The rush of getting out to the farm for Christmas, then stopping by mom's parents, and then dad's step mom, (whom we only knew as Grandma Roberts), and then more often than not, heading to Buffalo the next day for a several days hockey tournament, made that octave holiday a time of rest and relaxation. I remember waiting in anticipation to watch the Rose Bowl Parade. The creativity and ingenuity of those floats certainly spurred on my own imagination. The magic of all those floats coated with some form of floral works and the stories of their constructions, and the number of volunteers that made it possible only added to the mystic and wonder. And that was all the while we had a black and white television. The year we finally got a coloured television made the experience exciting and satisfying. It was way better than even the Santa Claus parade that marched down Main Street Holland Landing each year. As the years went by, and the excitement about the Rose Bowl parade waned, the Day still was a recovery day with not much happening. Mom and dad were not big party goers, and a social life in our home was very sporadic. Let's just say we were the opposite of party central in contrast to the people across the road whose driveway and roadside was lined with cars most weekends. In those university years, New Year's Day could very likely also be the day of packing to catch the bus to make it back up to Sudbury to begin the new term. My favorite New Year's Eve remains the year I was in my pastoral year during the seminary when I was stationed in Collingwood for the year. There were friends from university that had settled there and so with them and some teachers from the school we went out on the crisp evening, bathed in the bright last quarter moon that illuminated snowy fields. We were cross country skiing and the beauty and simplicity of the night evoked a profound silence as we all schussed along in single file. At midnight we all paused and had a little treat to welcome the New Year. I can still feel the freshness on my face, and hear the silence echo in my ears. Over the years, I've often thought about the adventure that night. For me it was the quintessential celebration of ushering in a new beginning immersed in the silence of the wonder of creation, the stars, the moon, the snow, the trees, and good friends. I remember thinking at the time that this will likely be my best New Year's Eve ever, and in many ways it was. So especially every year at this time, it matters not if I catch part of the Rose Bowl parade, or join in on some Eve festivities, I always harken back to that beautiful evening in Collingwood knowing that heaven had kissed the earth for a

brief moment, and heaven and earth rejoice. Not a bad way to meet 2022. Happy New Year.

New Recommendation from the Archdingese


The Archdiocese has issued a new set of restrictions due to the recent upsurge in the Omicron Strain of Covid19.

- "The Archdiocese strongly recommends against congregational singing at this time. A cantor or small choir remains acceptable."
- Virtual meetings are to replace in-person meetings.
- Remind parishioners that those feeling unwell should not attend Mass. People who are considered to be in the vulnerable sector should remain home.
- Remind those attending Church to maintain six for distancing during the Communion Procession.
- Remind parishioners not to congregate before or after Mass. Encourage them to go straight to their cars.
- Contact trace is now recommended at every parish in compliance with Public Health rules.

Monday, January 17 from 7:00 pm - 8:30 pm OR


Wednesday, January 19 from 7:00 pm - 8:30 pm
