

Ruminations

It is hard to believe that we just celebrated the fifth anniversary of mom being moved to the long term care facility. It was a Thursday morning, and my brother and mom's good friend had accepted the challenge of moving mom in. Early in the morning they picked mom up and went to Tim Horton's, and then off to her new digs. It was hard to know what mom had figured out. It wasn't until we were clearing the house to sell it that we discovered mom knew she was declining. She had several books on Dementia and preventing it and living with it. One of mom's greatest fears was that she would come down with this disease, and after experiencing dad's death at home, (and this anniversary is in a couple of weeks), mom really hoped that she too would die at home, maybe even while watching 'Whose Line is it Anyway' like dad did. Alas, none of it was to be. While she was living with me, there were many signs that this dementia was robbing her of the story of her life, and as gradual as it may have seen, she was plummeting. When she started wondering down the street, I knew it was impossible to keep her safe anymore and the inevitable time had arrived. So as mom was being dropped off, her final words of freedom were 'Well, if my family thinks this is the best for me, then so be it." Within 15 minutes, she had settled in and resigned herself to her new life. They tell us the dementia decline is a serious of plateaus and then quick deterioration, and then a plateau. For the most part, mom seemed oblivious to the depth of her loss. Quickly we saw that she was unable to use the phone or the new television that we got her. Then there was the day she introduced me to my new brother, a doll that she cared everywhere named 'Baby'. I had to inform her that 'Baby' was not being included in her will. She had developed a friendship with another resident who also had dementia. They would chat away to each other, neither listening to the other, and neither of them making any sense. There were also the two escapes from the locked down units. She was going to show her new friend her car in the parking lot. FYI, she didn't have a car in the parking lot. So now, there is no recognition of any of us, and the pictures in her room of her grandchildren are strangers. But all that, as tragic as it is for us to watch, even the health care workers acknowledge that she seems content and comfortable. She has lost the ability to be mobile, but she hums and sings to herself. She will burst into laughter at some joke only known to her, but she can't engage with anyone. Wherever she is, she seems at home. It has taken a long time for us to become comfortable with this new reality. Even though those wonderful workers have no idea of mom's story, or who she was in her other life, we remember on her behalf, and yes

we must resign ourselves that she is healthy as can be, she is safe, and she is well taken care of, and she is still with us. Not sure if we would describe it as a happy anniversary. Miss you mom.

What is Community Bread?


March 2003, the two Newmarket Parishes, St. John's and St. Elizabeth Se-
