#### **Ruminations** ....

For someone such as myself who finds the rituals and liturgies of this Paschal season truly inspiring and an absolute gift, there is a profound richness to these holy three days. As a Church community, I am not convinced that we have mined the depth of these events, including the transition from Lenten fast to Paschal fast. Not many of us have encountered the subtle shift in focus, or the reality of the Church's paschal fast. I have experienced those shocking realization when a loved one dies and the family is hoping to have a funeral mass on either the Thursday, Friday or Saturday of Holy Week, only to find out that they cannot. There may be a service, but no Eucharist on the Thursday or Saturday. There are no baptisms or confirmations, or weddings allowed, except in dire circumstances, and that means danger of death. This holds true for anointing of the sick and reconciliation. People can be miffed when they come on Good Friday seeking to confess, obviously not in any great life peril, only to be reminded that we have concluded our 40 days of preparation when such an action was foremost on the agenda. I love Holy Saturday with its Divine Office of Readings, my favorite reading of all the Breviary. One of the traditions that was not part of my life was the blessing of the Easter baskets. It is much more an Eastern European thing I think. I had never heard of it until I was in Ajax. I thought it was cute and we incorporated it with the RCIA candidates who came Holy Saturday for the pre-baptism anointing with the third sacred oil called Oil of Catechumens. They would make up little baskets of foods that they would share after their baptism at the Easter Vigil, or use the following morning to 'break the fast'. I had never really experienced an authentic 'blessing of the Easter baskets' until I witnessed Deacon Marian do his thing with the Polish Community. First, seeing the beauty and structure of these baskets with hand stitched clothes, decorated eggs and all the trimmings got the ol' stomach excited. Then the wonderful smells of the various meats and breads, and cheeses - it was a dining extravaganza. Each of these were a veritable feast in a basket. This past Saturday, we had about 30 people for the English version which was nice, but following that was the Polish version. The English version was like the meager opening show for the main event. There must have been over a couple hundred people coming to have the first Easter foods blessed, and the steps of the altar were filled with a smorgasbord of colours and foods and smells, like a high end delicatessen in the best sense. As I surveyed the delectable fare, I couldn't help but think that I had missed out in my own childhood of such a meaningful tradition. I thought of calling children's welfare and complaining about my parents' neglect on Easter morning breaking the fast. As I thought about it, I figured if we had created our own basket way back then, it would not have had meat and eggs, and salt and pepper and delicious breads. It would have been made up of a big bag of puffed wheat, a bag of powdered milk, and a loaf of 'Bambi White Bread'- hardly a celebration of the feast of Heaven. Anyway, I am going to bargain with Deacon Marian for next year and

combine the two blessings into a bilingual celebration and invite everyone to this great way of ushering in Easter morning. I reserve the right to have my pick of the baskets, and I will let Deacon Marian handle the Polish part. Thanks for a wonderful, hidden gem of a tradition. I'm licking my lips already. Happy Easter.
