Ruminations

Compared to Mothers' Day, Fathers' Day was rather understated growing up. Mothers' Day was a big event hosted by my grandaunts out on the farm. It was a compilation of all our birthdays, mom and dad's and all us boys, all rolled into one big event. Since everything fell within 55 days of each other, it was a way of celebrating everything all at once. Fathers' Day was usually just a few days before mom's birthday, and even dad was more focused on that. Heaven help us if we understate mom's birthday, the woman who feeds us. Mom was the type of person who let you know what she wanted. It made it incredibly easy to ensure that she had a glorious day. Dad on the other hand was always vague and evasive when it came time to gift give. I am not sure if he didn't know what he wanted or he truly didn't want any energy wasted on him. He was always a bit embarrassed when given any such attention. I do remember one Fathers' Day, his favorite. Mom and I were scheming. Weeks and maybe even months ahead we would begin discussions. Once I started working as a teenager, and actually had cash on hand, mom and I were shopping at the plaza. It was the place to go with both Zellers and Woolworths. Upper Canada Mass was not even in existence. As we wandered through Zellers, we came upon the perfect dad gift. In our previous discussions, this had never even entered the conversations. It was quite out of our normal price range by a lot, so it warranted more discussions and negotiations. Since it was something that would benefit the whole house, we decided that it was time and so we pooled our money and scheduled to purchase it on the Friday before Fathers' Day and have it set up in the living room for when dad arrived home from work. Now mom and I are not the handiest people with tools or construction or problem solving involving household functions. Crossword puzzles we could handle. After school mom and I went down to the Plaza and purchased our first, very own air-conditioner. Before this, our idea of air conditioning was a fan stuck in an open window, and having cold hand towels next to us to wipe our brow, or an open car window. As we struggled to get the window open, and then secure this beast of a machine hanging properly out the window, and then sealing off the spaces where insects could easily make it in, a job that in subsequent years took ten minutes max, drove us crazy for over two hours. We got it going about half an hour before dad was to arrive home, and you could almost immediately feel the cold air doing its thing. You could feel the temperature dropping. So then the anticipation began to build as we kept an eye out for dad to drive up. Every thirty seconds someone was peeking out the windows to see if dad had arrived yet. Finally we heard the car coming down the road. We drew the curtains closed for no good reason. Dad would not have been able to see this contraption through the kitchen windows anyway, but it build the suspense for us. The minute dad stepped through the door, he knew something was up. It wasn't the excited kids, or the grinning wife, it was the coldness that caught his attention. He simply drifted over to stand in front of the unit, open his shirt, and allow the blowing cold air to envelope him in ecstasy. We all shouted at once, 'Happy Fathers' Day'. It seemed that he stood there in a trance like state for the longest time. Finally he turned around, gave mom a big hug and then each of us kids. I didn't explain to him that the other three had nothing to do with it. We let them be a part of it, because that's what big brothers do. To this day I can't turn on air conditioning without thinking back in thanksgiving to that wondrous day. Happy Fathers' Day and here's to air conditioning.

As we speak, the hall kitchen is being prepared for its face-lift. The old two burner stove and oven has been removed. That humungous pizza oven, with great toil and seat has also been taken out and scrapped. It is amazing how much room the two of those appliances took up, and how dirty parts of the wall was behind them. They were both taken to the scrap yard, and for over the 1,000 pounds of scrap we got a little bit of money back, enough to pay for the hernias everyone got trying to get them out the door.

The new convection oven, the new four burner stove with oven, and two new gas fryers have been ordered and should be here either by the time you read this or early next week, or any combination thereof.

The new range hood and fire suppression system is scheduled to begin construction at the end of this week, before you reading this. If all goes to plan, and there are no surprise issues, when the end of June comes around, our new and improved kitchen should be ready to go.

The final piece of the puzzle will be the new carpeting in the hall. Financially we are close to being able to order it and have it installed. There is no time line on that, though once the kitchen is finished, we will seriously look at our options. And it is our hope that by the restart of September, all things will have been made new.
