Ruminations

November seems more like a transition month. Especially this year, with our unseasonably warm spell, it seems like we are just waiting for winter to come crashing in. My cousins out west have already experienced the onslaught of snow and cold weather. I wish I could say that I had sympathy for them, but with my jealousy of them being in the foothills of the mountains and a short drive to Banff, I just can't find it in my heart to console them. I am sure our time will come and in the midst of one of our cold snaps, they are just as likely to have the Chinook winds blow in and warm them up to spring like temperatures, so if they are suffering snow and blizzards, good on them. I love November. It is stark, and quiet and serene. No bugs, no weeding, no sunburns - what's not to like. At university, every year I was there, we had our first snow falls by the end of September, but in November, just before the exam season, it was time for the boards around our ball hockey rink to be put up. Ball hockey was a big deal on campus. One of the highlights of our Winter Carnival was the ball hockey tournament for both men and women. Our residence at a distinct advantage because of this rink that Frere Viau build and maintained for us. Every day, several times a day, once the ice was ready, there would be a ball hockey game going on the ice. The rink was a bit too small for ice skates, but it was perfect for our residence league. It was a game with much experimentation as to how to get the best grip on the ice. Different brands of running shoes were tried (not that there was a great variety though the old canvas running shoes became the shoe of choice.) We tried large thick elastic bands around our shoes to see if that would work. One year there was a rumour about the use of starch used for ironing and so the shelves at the local grocery store were stripped bare as no one wanted one team to get the advantage. The truth be known, it didn't work. There were some pretty cold days, so cold in fact, that there were discussions about postponing certain league games but it was agreed that it would be very unCanadian and so we risked frostbite and national humiliation and braved the worst that a Sudbury winter could throw at us, and we triumphed. The league was played on Sunday afternoons. Most people went to Sunday morning mass in the Grand Salon – rushed back to cook some form of breakfast/lunch in the big communal kitchen and then it was off to either watch or play as the games got underway. One of the first things that each floor did back in September was to decide on a floor name and then order hockey jerseys. Some of the names were creative, some endured from year to year, and some were maybe a little off-coloured. The first time I ever grew a moustache was because our floor wanted to call itself 'the Second Brown Staches', and so with great reluctance, I caved into the pressure by the 'Boys' I put my shaving kit away, well, and the rest is history. It was a great day and Frere Viau put the word out that this was the day to prepare the rink. He had more volunteers that he knew what to do with,

in no time at all the boards were constructed, and the light standards erected and tested to make sure that they worked, because we did have night games under the lights and stars of the winter skies. So November always reminds me of watching out the windows looking at our own rink, for the permanent snow to arrive and the cold weather to begin to form the first layers of the ice. 7r. Roy
