Ruminations

The first snowfall back in elementary school was a big deal. Our playground was a huge area that curved around the school and was a big grassy area. Close to the school on the south side was a paved area that was the girls' side. Boys in grade three or more were not allowed there, it was for girls and grade ones and twos only. There was a baseball screen that defined the big guys area where soccer games or football games unfolded, but only occasionally was there a game of baseball. It required more equipment than most people had and so to have enough gloves to play, the ease of either a soccer ball or football made them all the more enticing, and being a very multicultural school, most people were acquainted with soccer anyway. Because it was on the marsh, it was always a bit spongy underfoot, and if you knew where to look, it was easy to coax some crayfish out of their holes. Having a low tolerance for creepy crawly things, I was an infrequent spectator on such hunts. We did have a large raised football sized field that had the lushest green grass. We were not allowed on that as it was the necessary septic system, and in a low lying marshy area, it was a vital place kept free from the riggers of a school full of young people. When the first snow came, the area beyond the baseball fence became the snowball area. Yes, we were allowed to partake in the truly Canadian adventures of snowball fights. Sides were selected and the wailing began. There were a couple of rules: no ice balls, no projectiles with stones in them, and do not aim for the head. Other than that, it was a free for all. If you stepped beyond the boundary, you were fair game, except of course, for teachers, unless they too indulged in tossing a couple at their most deserving students. Most of the time the girls would stand on the edge of the boundary, at a couple of steps in and launch a snowball and then quickly retreat outside the snowball field. With a good, wet snow, snow forts were erected that offered a bit of protection, and strategies were planned on how best to best the opposition. Lots of times sides were determined by grade levels, the eights against the sevens or the like. The snowball season had a limited duration. Back then, winters certainly seemed colder and once the temperature dropped far enough, it was next to impossible to make snowballs, so we had to make the best of it while the snow remained good for packing. I remember in Ajax, the rectory had access to the top of the garage and it overlooked the school yard. I was not aware of 'new winter snowball policies' and so I went out and started launching a barrage of snowballs at the kids, who enthusiastically returned the volleys. Soon after that, I was called into the principal's office and I was duly informed that 'we are not allowed to throw snowballs' in our enlightened days. It brings out lawsuits and phone calls, and unhappy parents. My how things had changed. If you were in the snowball area and got beamed, it was your own fault for venturing into hostile territory. I was dumbfounded. In my day, no one was drastically hurt except maybe their ego, but being bundled up in winter attire, with big, thick layers of insulation, even the strongest grade eight would have a hard time penetrating such formidable cushioning to do much hurt or harm. Not to sure when fun and games became overthrown by pampering. After my 'education chat' with the principal, I went back to the roof, and when he wasn't watching, launched my final snowball at the school. Let it snow, let it snow, let is snow!
