Ruminations

The end of January and beginning of February were exciting times on campus. The anticipation of our reading week in mid-February was a nice carrot on a stick to ease the burden of the studies. It was also the time of the annual Winter Carnival, which trumped over Valentine's Day which usually occurred during Reading Week. Carnival was a week long series of activities, dances, parties, snow sculptures, spaghetti dinners, pancake breakfasts, Bonhomme Carnival, sports activities and the highlight of it all, at least from the Sports Administration students' perspective, the Spad Hockey Tournament. This was a tournament where intermural hockey teams from universities all over Ontario would participate. It will soon celebrate 50 years. It was a big deal. It was the fourth year students who organized this event, booking Sudbury Arena where the Sudbury Wolves Junior A hockey team played. It added a level of importance and professionalism. In my third year, my brother who was attending the University of Guelph, mostly because he couldn't get into Laurentian arrived to play in the tournament. Goalies were rare commodities in campus leagues, and seeing as my brother had played Junior Hockey, and in fact, had played in Sudbury arena, it felt like a bit of homecoming. As it turned out, he had been recruited by two different intermural teams and so he had a very busy couple of days in the tournament. Now in the programs, his name was only registered under one team. The other team listed him by a pseudonym. It was not permitted to play for more than one team. In fact, when he returned to the Guelph league, he was banned for life from their intermural hockey. I can't remember the exact reason, but it had something to do with the other goalie getting sick, so there was no intent to cheat. It didn't matter that much because both teams lost out of the tournament and went home empty handed. If I recall correctly, though I must confess that my mind might be a bid dodgy, after all, in the larger scale of life, winning a hockey tournament, even as prestigious and important as the Spad Hockey Tournament is, registers not in vivid memories of goals and body checks and shut outs, but only as faint glimmers of having the fun and excitement of playing with friends, most of whom have long since ceased to be a part of my life. I don't remember having any pictures of the games tucked away somewhere, probably mostly because few university students had cameras, and certainly not cell phones that could record the event. In fact, there were not even computers on campus except for the intro course to computer science which relied on the old punch cards being fed into a machine that instructed the computer that was hidden somewhere else in the building, and then to spit out the results on a dot -matrix printout. You had to race up the stairs to the printing room to retrieve your results before it got buried in miles of dot-matrix paper from all the other people working on their own computer assignments. Winter Carnival was a great way to defy the Sudbury winters and break

the tension of the pressures of studies, and in the middle of winter, it was a welcomed ray of sunshine because the days were definitely longer, the sun was higher, and Spring was on its way.

Thank you for your continued encouragement and financial support. Combined, the people of Newmarket donated \$113,035 toward the work of our parishes' SSVP Conference in 2022 – with most of that money coming from the parishioners of the two Newmarket parishes of St John Chrysostom and St Elizabeth Seton. This was a wonderfully generous response considering the increase in cost-of-living last year. So, how did we use the \$121,062 that we spent of your donations? (Yes, there was a deficit of about \$8,000.)

Our Conference offers a number of ways of helping the families and individuals in need who come to us:

1. **Good Food Box**: A monthly package of fresh vegetables and fruit valued at \$15 from the York Region Food Network; some families in need received this twice per month. In 2022 we sponsored 884 of these Good Food Boxes.

2. **Grocery Food Cards** (Food Basics/Metro): Families and individuals in need also need to buy other groceries not available in the Good Food Box and may request food cards from our Society for this purpose *once every 3 months* - \$20 per family member plus \$40 for the household. *Is this enough? Of course not, but it is all our budget would allow.* In 2022 we distributed food cards to a total value of \$58,430 to 288 different families and people in need.

3. **Christmas Programs**: Last Christmas, and after a break due to COVID-19, we were all grateful to return to our tradition of selecting stars from the *Giving Tree* and bringing gifts in a joint venture involving volunteers from our two parishes and your SSVP Conference. Also, your contributions to our *SSVP Christmas Program* enabled families in need to buy food for a festive meal and Christmas gifts for 284 children. The total cash value of these two programs was \$38,553, not including the gifts for stars on the Giving Tree. Your gifts and financial donations enabled us to provide Christmas cheer for approximately 800 people: seniors, people who are home-bound, and families, including families in shelters.

4. **Special Needs**: Many if not most families in Canada are just one or two pay cheques away from losing their home. Sometimes a family finds themselves in a crunch and needs a leg up or a helping hand to keep their home (for example) or to have a decent bed for a senior with a health condition. We have a budget of \$500 per month to help one or two such families or individuals at a time.

North of 60: Started last year, this is an initiative to collect basic food stuff for the people of Sanirajak, an Arctic community in Nunavut. With the monies collected we will be buying in bulk to fill a container to be shipped from Montreal direct to Sanirajak on the shores of the Northwestern Passages, between Baffin Bay and Hudson Bay. Last year we collected \$22,201 of our target amount of \$25,000.

Last year your Vincentians, all volunteers who see their work as a ministry to the Body of Christ, spent just shy of 3,500 hours ensuring that your donations went to the people who needed assistance, especially food assistance – for the low cost of only 1.78% on administration.

Seeing a smiling and helpful face as the family and friends of the deceased come through the door adds a great sense of comfort. In this day and age, with many 'un-Churched' people who may feel very awkward and uncomfortable in the Church setting, especially in the midst of sorrow and grief, this Ministry provides a strong sign value, that we as a Community of Faith, welcome them and are here to support them as they walk this journey.

So Funeral ministers welcome mourners, open doors, uses umbrellas when necessary, answers questions and provide a strong voice during the Mass. Ministers also provide guidance in setting up for the Funeral Mass, serve as Eucharistic ministers when needed, and help offer a strong witness on behalf of the Community of St. Elizabeth Seton. Families are very thankful for these ministers.

Martha & Mary Funeral Luncheon Ministry

Many funerals have a reception after the Mass. We are fortunate in our parish to have excellent facilities to host such an event. As much as the liturgical celebration is important, so too, is the opportunity for fellowship and meeting with the family. It is a vital part of the family's bereavement journey.

So our Martha & Mary Ministry serves this need in various capacities by providing food and service. Sometimes the family gathering is small, and sometimes not so small. Usually we receive only a couple of days notice and so there can be a bit of scurrying around at the last a worthwhile ministry and provides a huge act of Hospitality.
