

Ruminations

The arrival of September always bears with it a tendency for nostalgia. at least when you reach a certain vintage. It is always marked by an implicit and/or explicit sense of fresh starts, and because of the structures of our society, it has become a revving up of life and life's busy-ness. The beginning of school has a lot to do with that. As a society, whether we are in the midst of returning to the classrooms, or it has been years, even decades since we have experienced that ritual, something in our heads triggers a new ebb and flow to life, even as nature begins a different mode of being. As nature slows down and prepares for a winter lull, we speed up and prepare for the onslaught of activities. I can remember vividly my first day of kindergarten, high school, university, and the seminary. For kindergarten, we had been given a list of things that we would need, an oversized shirt to wear as a painting smock, a blanket for our nap time before lunch, and of course, lunch, and money if you were going to purchase a bottle of milk, and chocolate milk was an option. Most everything else was provided by the school. As mom dropped me up with my brothers in tow, one of my brothers, who shall remain nameless, less his children catch wind of it, started running around the classroom refusing to leave. Luckily my aunt, who was dropping off my cousin and who had fewer babes in arms, was there to help catch the little miscreant. My first day of high school was a disaster at best, not a scarring episode, just a long drawn out, sitting in the office type of day as somehow they had no timetable of classes for me to attend. The one that was provided for me as a grade twelve schedule and I knew walking into the first class that something was amiss. It remains a mystery to this day. The day of actual classes at university was rather uneventful compared to the trauma of being left in my new room at residence, watching mom and dad drive away until I would venture home for Thanksgiving. After a five hour hike through the trails of Sudbury, I had to steel myself with the resolution that I needed to do this, and returning home was not an option. Luckily the residence had an excellent transition called Frosh Week which was a series of activities like pancake breakfasts, and spaghetti dinners to help initiate the frosh into university life. For a shy, introvert from small town Ontario, it was a life-saver. By the time the first day of classes rolled around, there was a group of fast friends to accompany you through the new educational model. It has been almost forty years since I had that first entrance into seminary life. I remember passing through the gates and driving down the long, tree-lined lane at the seminary. There was a sign posted part way down that said, "No Exit". Suddenly the song 'Hotel California' started ringing in my ears, and a huge pit in my stomach grew. The seminary is a huge, impressive structure on acres of land overlooking Lake Ontario. It is on top of the Scarborough Bluffs, a beautiful spot really. But as you mount the stairs leading up to the humungous, heavy bronze doors that require a huge effort just to open, you can't imagine what the future holds. Luckily my September. Of course back


