Ruminations

Sometimes it seems like Mother Nature has a hidden switch that changes the seasons almost overnight. One late summer day and it is air-conditioning hot, and then the night drops to jacket weather and the next day dawns with leaves on the trees changing colours and the closets are ruffled looking for warmer clothing. Personally I love leaving summer behind and moving into the early throes of the Fall, knowing full well that there will still be some shorts weather in the offing before the snow flies. These days always evoke memories from childhood. It is on such days that signalled the time to head over to the farm and raid the orchards for apples and pears. Not being a fan of pears, that side of the orchard was of little interest, but the apple side was a little piece of heaven. I can still remember those old trees, thick and gnarled, filled with haunting character and of course, ripe and ripening fruit. My aunts had long ago given up on spraying the trees to protect them from the worms so it was always a desperate search to find a clean apple. My aunts usually processed the apples into apple sauce, apple butter or sliced for pies. That meant that the fruits would be sliced and any undesirable parts or inhabitants were eliminated and no one was the wiser. It was also the time of cleaning up the reforestation area around the pond, clearing and burning downed branches and overgrown shrubs. This was an exercise repeated again in the Spring, cleaning out the paths from the harshness of the winter. It was always mystifying as to why this was so important and undertaken so regularly because I don't remember anyone using that part – in the summer it was a war zone of mosquitos and black flies, and in the winter it was to treacherous. I think the only time the path was used was in the Fall and Spring when we went in to clean up the path. However, the kindling was collected and set afire in the recently plowed fields. It just added to the magic of the time, the smell of burning wood, and the aroma of harvested fruit. When we finally left for home, the trunk of the car stacked with boxes and bags of our take of fruit, it was a family effort for most of the week to get things done. Everyone participated in some way, peeling, slicing, stirring, but most important sampling. I think my youngest brother who was too young to be trusted with a paring knife or sharp peeler, so his contribution was more along the lines of the official taste tester. Mom made a mean apple jelly, and the apple sauce was so delicious. I was not really fond of the apple butter, but no matter, the whole house smelled of cooking apples, cinnamon, spices, and apples. It was an exhausting week but when the shelves were filled with freshly sealed jars of sauce, and jelly, and jam, it was all worth it. I don't remember what happened with the pears, mostly because I didn't care for them, but I am sure for those who like things made with pears, mom would have concocted something equally delicious. There came a time when those ancient trees needed to come down. They had done their job, supplying at least five generations with fresh fruit, lots of entertainment climbing their sprawling branches, replete with a few broken bones for those who took a misstep or two. So the day they arranged to have the orchard cut down, we gathered with a tinge of sadness, but a great sense of thanksgiving for these stalwart friends, and lots of laughter for the gift of the produce and the gift of the stories of apple picking over the years. So

when the weather turns autumnal, and the clouds of the Fall darken, and the sun shining in the lowering sky, a spell of nostalgia surfaces, the smell of burning wood reminding me of the generations of family members who walked that orchard, and feasted on the wares. And I have to confess, I miss those gnarly old trees.

Registrations for First Communion

& Confirmation

For those young people who are in at least Grade 2 are eligible to register for First Communion next Easter Season. Those young people in at least Grade 7 are eligible to enroll in preparations to celebrate Confirmation around Pentecost next Spring.
