Ruminations

Well our first round of retreats for the first communion candidates is complete. This retreat was about reconciliation. Over ninety young people were treated to three stations; one was a story about family prayer; another was the video called 'The Festival Fabric' about forgiveness; and finally there was a tour of the various components of the physical building, the four most important pieces of Church furniture; the ones that the instructions on building a new church highlight as essential in taking time and care to do justice to their significance. On the tour we talk about the baptismal font at the entrance and ponder why it was put there instead of up front. We talk about the three oils we use, and how the one oil, the Sacred Chrism is used in both baptism and confirmation, in the blessing of the altar and the walls of the Church. We show them the dedication candles, the gold coloured crosses with the little candle holders on them - the place where the Bishop smeared the Sacred Chrism on the walls, and how the priests' hands are also anointed with that oil. We discussed why they were baptized, precisely so that they can come to the Table of the Lord and we all go to the altar. We discuss how it is both an altar and a table so we call it the altar-table. An altar is only used for sacrifice which is one element of the Eucharist, but it is also a table where the family dines, and the table is a quintessential symbol of the family, and the kingdom of God in our midst. We then talk about a second table where we are also fed by the Word of the Lord, and how the Word is a description of Jesus. We call it the Table of the Word. Then we move on to the final piece of furniture - the Chair, of course not the deacons' chairs, but the presider's chair. So we talk about my boss, the Archbishop and how he presides at a really big Church called a Cathedral. Now they have a hard time remembering the bishop's name and I have to confess I do too. Sometimes I still think of the bishop as Cardinal Carter which is going back way too far. So then we discuss what the word 'cathedral' means and they are surprised that it actually means 'chair' and that we name a whole building after the chair. Then with time permitting we visit the relic of St. Elizabeth Seton in the candle area. We talk about the red candle on the wall and what it means, and then we quietly, or as quietly at a group of young people can be, we enter the Chapel of Reservation and explain the Tabernacle - and how it means a tent - but now signifies a container with something really important in it. We explain its main purpose is to store the Blessed Sacrament for bringing communion to the sick and dying. We practice genuflecting to the tabernacle and explain that we don't genuflect to the altar, instead we bow to the altar. Then we head off to the Reconciliation Room and play with the green and red light. Thus endeth the tour. When the three groups assemble again at the end, I ask them what they enjoyed the most. It isn't the story about family prayer. It is not the rich depth of the Festival Fabric, and it's not the intriguing story behind the items on the tour. It is invariably the 'guts' of the baptismal

font, where I show them how we fill the font with water, and where the filtration system is hidden, and how the ultra-violet filter kills the germs. I guess plumbing and mechanicals are more interesting than the theology of the chair, or the connection to St. Elizabeth Seton with her relic. Oh well, at least now they will know that our font water is recycled every 5 minutes and comes out clean and germ free. Maybe in a Covid world, that is a good thing. \Im_{7x} . \Re_{0y}
