### **Ruminations** ....

It was a day of reckoning of sorts. Kind of a day I had been waiting for with a bit of excitement and a bit of trepidation. It was time for my appointment with my diabetes doctor. Now over the years, I have been told more often than not that I am too sweet. Not a good thing for a diabetic. The last conversation we had was back in September when a whole knew drug regimen was designed. Shortly after that is when I got serious about trying to drop a few pounds, well maybe more than just a few. That started just before Thanksgiving and within a couple of weeks, I was having extremely good blood sugar readings. That combined with the new medications, I started getting readings which were too low. Likely most people are not up on the current diabetes protocols. A normal body runs blood sugar levels between 4 - 6. Maybe after a big meal or lots of carbs like pasta, the sugar levels might spike above that, but after two hours they should return to the normal range. Above 4 as a resting measure is not good but sinking below the 4 range can be dangerous. As excited as I was having readings in the normal range, the below 4 levels were disconcerting, so I started weaning myself off some of the medications to the point where I was off them totally and still having 'normal' or acceptable readings. There are two different measurements that diabetics track. The first one is the daily sugar levels, which depending on the circumstances, can be taken several times. The more telling measurement is tracked with blood work, called the AIC. This is a three month average. A normal range should fall between the 4-6level. My highest average was over 9. Back in September I had brought it down to mid 7's, so this Spring appointment was kind of a happy event. A couple of things about this blood work was exciting. It started with the nurse hitting my vein on the first try. That in itself was a happy event. There have been times when I was jabbed and poked on both arms trying to find a vein leaving bruises and bandages up and down the arms, so one shot needle was welcomed, and I whole-heartedly attribute that to the weight drop. By the end of that night I was able to go on line and get the results of the blood sugar. I was ecstatic to see the AIC result – 6.1, so close to normal. So my phone appointment began with questions about how my medications are going. I informed the doctor that I hadn't had any medications since October. She was surprised in a good way. I explained what I had been doing - no carbs or fruit for almost six months. I confessed that the blood sugar levels have increased a bit but still not high. WE chatted about a go forward plan because come Easter Sunday, I am starting to re-introduce some of



those foods, very deliberately and very cautiously, starting with my most wonderful Easter meal – pizza. The doctor said that it was a great result, but go cautiously. And best of all, she is 'rooting' for me. It was a resurrection of sorts.





### HOLY WEEK

We enter into Holy Week with a Grand Entrance. Beginning with a Gospel account of Jesus' triumphant reception as he entered into Jerusalem, the Church enters into this holiest time of our Church calendar. Palm Sunday, or more appropriately Passion Sunday, each year we recount the unfolding of the suffering and death of Jesus based on the Gospels of Mark, Matthew and Luke on a yearly rotation. John's passion narrative is reserved for Good Friday.

Holy Week is also the time for the yearly Mass of the Sacred Chrism. Traditionally this was held on the Thursday morning of Holy Week. That is why there is no prescribed Mass on Thursday mornings. In many dioceses around the world, this special Mass where the new oils used by the Church are blessed, the oil of the sick and the oil of the catechumens, and the sacred Chrism is consecrated. It is also the renewal of the priests assembled together with the bishop. In our Archdiocese, this special celebration is anticipated on the Tuesday morning of Holy week.

Lent ends with the setting of the sun on Holy Thursday evening, in Newmarket at 7:41 pm or the beginning of the Mass of the Lord's Supper at 7:30 pm. With our Lenten journey complete, the Church enters into the Sacred Triduum (the Holy Three Days). During these days no funerals or weddings or confirmations or first communions or baptisms are permitted. Starting with the Mass of the Lord's Supper, replete with the washing of the feet as an optional ritual, the Church begins its journey to the celebration of the Resurrection. This feast celebrates the institution of the Eucharist. It does not end with the traditional dismissal, well, because it doesn't end. The Church keeps watch and gathers once again on Good Friday for the Veneration of the Cross, which is an extension of the Mass the evening before. With John's account of the Passion recounted, the Church venerates the Cross acknowledging that Christ has conquered all sin, past, present and future. The Church departs in silence for sober reflection the meaning of this Paschal Mystery in our lives and we await the celebration of the 'Mother of All Liturgies" (St. Augustine) the Great Easter Vigil.

Before that celebration though, the Church prepares those adults who have been journeying in the RCIA for their full initiation at the Vigil. They are anointed with the Oil of the Catechumens, freshly blessed by the Bishop earlier in the week. Some traditions have a blessing of Easter baskets, filled with all the delicious and delectable foods with which the family will 'break the fast' on Easter morning, meats, eggs, breads are just some of the items. This is a wonderful tradition that the whole Church should partake of because it really speaks of a Kingdom meal.

At the Vigil, started once the sun has gone down (7:43 pm in Newmarket) the community gather outside before the Easter fire where the new Easter Candle or Paschal Candle is lit. The history of salvation is traced through the Scriptures culminating in the Resurrection story. The RCIA are initiated and the rest of us renew our own baptisms. We have entered officially into Easter and for 8 days or an Octave we celebrate Easter morning, and for 50 days, we celebrate the great festival of Easter, until it ends on the 50th day, Pentecost.


