Ruminations....

The concept of 'dog years' is an interesting expression. Our dog lived for eighteen years which was most of my teen years and early adulthood. It was a sad day when he had to take him to the veterinarian and have him euthanized. For fun we would often calculate how old he was in human years, and in those last few years, he was starting to look his age, needing to be helped up on to chairs or beds, and coaxed to go outside and do his business in inclement weather. When the great horned owl took up residence, he never went outside on his own, and there was always a broom nearby to fend off any airborne attacks. Well, last week on the Priests' seminar, we have our own version of dog years, we call it 'priest years.' The first seminars that I attended were held at Cranberry Inn in Collingwood. We were definitely the young pups. Back then, you would not become a pastor for at least fifteen years, providing lots of mentorship and pastoral experience. That certainly provided a much more seasoned priest. Nowadays, if the newly ordained get to have five years, that is a bonus. To be honest, five years as an associate is still the honeymoon stage. I remember admiring those priests who had celebrated twenty-five years or more just thinking wow. With my own twenty-five years long behind me, and with recognizing just how quickly it passes, the wow is not so much an amazement as it is a wondering where the time went. So being at the upper end of the priest timeline, knowing that some of those young whipper snapper priests filled with naïve energy and inexperience are looking at me wondering when I will retire so they can get their own pastor ship, well, lets just say that sitting at our 'old priests' table for dinner prompts some interesting remarks and conversations about the poor people of God, commenting on the priest years of service knowing they still have soooo much to learn. Anyway, the seminar was geared to enlivening parish life trying to find ways to counteract the post Covid loss of parishioners compounded by the growing decline in general of organized religion. The presentations were almost like a sales convention of the various programs out there, Alpha, Divine Renovation, Reformed, Called and Gifted, etc. and each one thought they were going to save the Church. There were some interesting observations and even better tangents, but the reality was that most parishes were more concerned about how to empower the low percentage of parishioners who are attending, how to involve them in the life of the community. One of the most interesting and maybe scary statistics was the difference in participation levels between Catholics and other denominations. The Jehovah Witnesses were best at having their people learn about their faith. Ninety percent of them attend their weekly faith formation groups. The evangelicals were best at getting people involved in worship ministries and outreach to the poor and needy. The Salvation Army had the strongest sense of pastoral responsibility to the community at large. The only thing that the Catholics led in was numbers of the congregation, but the recent StatsCan information is that less than 12% of people who call themselves Catholics attend Mass on a regular basis (defined as once a month). No one has the magic elixir or formula in motivating the congregation to take the life of the worshiping community seriously. Here too, we are struggling to fill in some of our basic pastoral needs. We have unbaptized children waiting to be formed, but no one to lead them. We have adults journeying to Easter reception with no one to walk with them. We have confirmation young people ready for their groups but no one to facilitate them.

There are lots of things, but how do we motivate people to actually take ownership of parish life. At the end of the seminar, there were no great solutions only a common lament that the Holy Spirit seems to be sleeping on the job. Anway, welcome to parish life in the new millennium. At my dinner table, the eight of us collectively had over 240 years of priest years, the table beside us had 43. The one priest at our table had more than that by himself. Fr. Roy
