Ruminations

I haven't seen a winter with this much snow for years, maybe more like decades. The last time I saw this much snow was in the mountains of Banff and Whistler. It seemed every morning we ventured out of the hotel, there would be piles of snow, and there was a race to get up the mountains because there is a concept called First Tracks. What this means is trying to be the first skiers on the hill after the mountain crews have groomed the trails. Fresh snow, fresh groomed slopes and the sun coming up over the mountain, it was like Seventh Heaven, which was the name of my favorite slope on Blackcomb Mountain. The gentle slopes, wide open glades and empty snows all pointed to this hill being aptly named. FYI, Whiskey Run was another beautiful run, though I won't even venture on how it got its name. With all the snow over the last week, there is something oddly familiar about it which has nothing to do with skiing out West. These snow piles and manicured streets, and clean lined boundaries take me back to the winters growing up. I remember trudging down the hills at home to the frozen pond with its perpetually lit fire pit thanks to the neighbourhood dads. The snow was so deep that it would bury the boots and they would fill up with the fluffy white stuff. There was a fallen tree that acted like a bench, not much room, but space for three skaters. So the first thing to do was to shake out the snow and then don the skates. Then it was time to pick up the snow shovels that were left by the tree and begin pushing the snow build up to the sides and clear the rink. Cheeks got cold, noses got cold, and toes got cold, but it was a pure piece of Canadiana. Dad would regale us with stories of his youth, when the snow piles were higher than him, and after school all the chums would race off to their own pond in Oak Ridges. They too would shovel the rink, and freeze the toes, and noses and cheeks, all in the name of fun and being alive – alive in defiance of the winter. It was a way of taming the winter beast. The mountains of snow piled in the back corner, quickly burying parking spaces, and overflowing into the back gardens just brought me back to those early winters, with clean, white munchable snow, not the slushy, dirty version of winter that we have experienced. It also reminded me of the shared duty of making sure that our driveway at home was cleared before dad got home from work. There was a stipulation that if dad had to do it, it would mean not being able to make the hockey game that night, and with the four boys in hockey, there was always an arena in our sights. Being the eldest, that duty usually fell to me, the same with cutting the grass. No I'm not bitter – anymore, but if

mom ever wanted to know why my baby brother always had his face washed with snow by me, well, they say confession is good for the soul. Here's to the good ol' days when winter was winter and the cold wouldn't bother us anyway. Let is snow, let is snow, let it snow.


