# **Ruminations** ....

I've heard the scourge of renovations, how one small change leads to another and another and another. It started here a couple of years ago. Little parish angels who know way more than me came to rectify the rectory, and laminate flooring was laid and the problem resolved - mostly. In the meantime, some idiot had created raised gardens to the side of the kitchen. Suddenly water started flowing into the kitchen causing mold and damage to the walls. Especially during the freeze thaw cycle this winter, little ponds under the kitchen table would appear. So now the kitchen needs repairs and the gardens have to be remediated. FYI that idiot was me. Who knew that blocking the flow of water off the wall and through the bricks would create such a hassle. So now the kitchen tiles had to be lifted to do the repairs of the water damage. Now because the walls had to be replaced as high as the water damage and a bit extra for good measure, the kitchen has to be repainted. So because of the design of the building, the colour of the dining room should match the colour the kitchen, but who remembers the colour of the dining room? And since the island with the stove in the middle of it needed to be removed to lift the tiles, well quite frankly everyone agrees that the kitchen looks better without the stove in the middle. Where to put the stove? Well, maybe part of the counter could be removed to put the stove there, though the wiring needs to be tunnelled over to the spot. But then there is the issue of lost storage space for pots and pans. Well then, the stove if it is in the new spot would need a fan but of course that involves creating a framework for it. So then maybe the lights need to be re-positioned. But if the stove goes there, does the eating area need



to be changed, and if so what happens with the hanging light. And if the walls have new paint, the curtains don't really to with the wall colour.
