# **Ruminations** ....

For me, the most understated high school course was geography. It didn't have the glitz and glam of chemistry or math, but I always enjoyed it, especially when we investigated the natural rhythms of the earth. The solstices and the equinoxes, the seasons, the tides, the Gulf Stream, glaciation, I found all these utterly fascinating. I still remember Mr. Rose standing on top of the desks pretending he was a glacier rolling across the land pushing anything on the desks, textbooks, pens and pencil cases along as debris to be deposited when the glacier stops. The celestial phenomena are wondrous. The scientists are able to predict so accurately when winter or summer actually begin, when the earth is closest or furthest from the sun. By the way, the earth is closest to the sun in winter by over 4 million miles, just in case it ever comes up on Jeopardy. We just entered into the Fall season this past week when we celebrated the autumnal equinox, the period when there is equal day and equal night, twelve hours each. But that is only for one part of the globe. Globally the equinox was on Monday, but here in Newmarket area, the equinox was Wednesday. The sunrise was at 7:08 am and sunset was 7:08 pm. I'm not sure if anyone else celebrated but I watched the sun come up and go down as tribute to the wonder of the universe. It wasn't too long ago when I would wake up on Sunday mornings with the sun high in the sky, bright and scorching, and now it is still dark with just a hint of the coming of the dawn. These rhythms of nature rule much of the Church liturgies. The themes of Advent and Lent, Easter and Christmas are rooted in the ebb and flow of the seasons. The problem with this is that it is very much a northern hemisphere perspective. For us the theme of re-birth and new life that is our Easter perspective is lost in Australia or anywhere else south of the equator. During our Spring, they are entering autumn with all their flowers and trees going into dormancy, and the annual migrations begin, of birds flying north. I know that this process of daylight waning began way back in June, but throughout most of the summer its decline is gradual and almost imperceptible. At some point it seems to hit a cliff and begins plummeting, and even the best attempts of moving the clocks ahead or back does little. So the relaxed pace of summer gives way to the cozy days of autumn, with thoughts of harvests and apple crisp (yes a shameless plug for the CWG's sales coming up soon), and the reality of sports schedules and dance routines, and the myriads of other time commitments that



quicken our lives. The root of the word autumn denotes a passing of time or a passing of the year. It is by its nature reflective. I think though, by far, the best thing about the Fall, with warm autumn days, and refreshing cool mornings is the fact that there are no mosquitoes or other creepy crawling insects to spoil a nice sit on the patio watching the stars as the nights get longer and longer.  $\mathcal{F}r. \mathcal{R}ay$
