

Ruminations

Spring break was not a great occasion for any fun or exciting events like trips to Florida, or Cuba. Since most families only had one car and dad needed that one for work, and there was no such thing as a local bus service, we were pretty much confined to our own wiles in downtown Holland Landing. I have only one memory of hockey tournaments during a spring break and it was a Silver Stick tournament in Midland where we were billeted out with local families. I think it was a novice tournament and we had to win our way into it. I have no recollection of wins or losses or any of the activities or sights that we saw. I am pretty sure we didn't win it but no matter... With only three unreliable television channels, and in an era when morning and afternoon programming was far from kid friendly, and it goes without saying that the closest we came to electronic games was 'Operation', that if your tool touched the side of the 'body' being operated on, a buzzer sounded and the red nose on the patient lit up. By spring break, the pond was usually too unstable for skating and shinny, and the toboggan hill was speckled with grassy patches, this was a recipe for boredom and or mischief. On occasion the weather permitted us to get our bikes out of their winter hibernation in the basement, but for most of those school years, our roads were dirt roads, and at that time of the year, more like mud roads. It amuses me to no end to hear this generation of young people, with access to television channels galore (thinking of Bruce Springsteen's '57 channels and nothing on' song), electronics more powerful than the computers used to go to the moon, ample recreational programs, and access to myriads of activities, complaining about being bored. They have no idea. I remember my last spring break back in grade 13, and grade 13 is another thing we might need to explain to our young spring breakers, knowing it was my last kick at the can, being taken very seriously. I planned a trip to Sudbury to visit the campus of Laurentian University. Back then, Sudbury was pretty desolate. It was famous for providing opportunities of the NASA space program to practice walking on the moon. It was rocks and trees and lakes, and slag heaps, mostly rocks though. I was exploring the opportunity of attending there for university. Most of my classmates had never heard of Laurentian and likely had no idea where it was. I also took the opportunity to work diligently on the grade 13 chemistry project on the chemistry of blood. Laurentian had a science library that was equipped for the nursing program with more books on medicine than the new library in Holland Landing had in total. I felt so studious glancing through the card files and searching the stacks of books. I think that particular spring break



was a turning point. Besides acing my chemistry paper, and falling in love with Laurentian and Sudbury, I knew it was time to move on to bigger and better things. Now however, as I am preparing to enter into my seventh decade, the notion of a week off to be bored sounds pretty enticing. There is a Bruce Springsteen song for that too, it's called 'Glory Days'! Happy Spring Break.

<u>Coronavirus (COVID-19) Preventative</u> <u>Measures in Place</u>

The Archdiocese of Toronto continues to work with health officials to monitor the local situation regarding active cases of the coronavirus (COVID-19). At this time, Cardinal Collins has asked all parishes to implement the following measures: **1.** At the Sign of Peace, refrain from shaking hands – a simple bow, nod or "Peace be with you" to your neighbour is appropriate. **2.** For parishes offering communion under both species, forgo the distribution of the Precious Blood from the chalice for the congregation at this time. **3.** Parishes should ensure that those distributing communion wash their hands or use hand sanitizer before and after the distribution of communion.

Please also continue to practice healthy hygiene – wash your hands with soap or use hand sanitizer regularly, remain home if you are sick, sneeze/cough into your sleeve and avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Let us continue to care for ourselves and one another as we pray for all those impacted worldwide by COVID-19.
